COVID-19 Update | March 25, 2020



Dear Jason,



The Hunger Coalition is seeing double. In the first week since the COVID-19 outbreak touched Blaine County, we provided groceries for an all-time record high number of families – 260 or twice as many as usual. This is heartbreaking, but not surprising.

The economic impact of the coronavirus hit hard overnight and will echo well into the future. Last week, we spoke with families whose breadwinner was laid

off, families whose hours were cut, or who had to take time from work because a loved one was showing symptoms. There were many people we had never helped before and some who were returning to our pantry after years away. **Despite the uncertainty, there was more talk of gratitude than fear.** 

With twice as many families needing food came twice as many people offering to help. Whether it was a call for money, time, grocery bags, or shelfstable food items, our community responded in spades. In fact, there are several local people who've organized fundraisers on our behalf. Volunteers rocked masks and gloves to bag spinach outside and walk food boxes out to cars. Our Bloom Bins are full of healthy, non-perishable food items that have been essential as so many of our food suppliers are maxed out.

As I write this, The Hunger Coalition is continuing to provide curbside food boxes to all families who are struggling to afford food. Each day, we adapt our operations to keep our staff, participants, and volunteers safe. With the current isolation order, we are trying to keep our team healthy by limiting the number of people we are in contact with. As a result, we've paused as many volunteer roles as possible. The impact of the COVID-19 outbreak hasn't been easy on anyone, but it's times like these with people like you that we're confident our community will only grow stronger. Thank you.

From the school district: "Children DO NOT need to qualify for free and reduced lunch. This is open to anyone, no questions asked. In fact, this just might be the new place to be ... just don't socialize or congregate and remember to keep your social distance."
