

Using Data to Enhance Campus Culture and Advance Student Outcomes



Among 58 community colleges in North Carolina, Guilford Technical Community College (GTCC) is the system's third largest, serving more than 40,000 students annually. GTCC's five campuses, all located in Greensboro, Jamestown, and High Point, have held student needs and service as a campus mission since its inception in 1958.

As higher education leaders nationwide increase their focus on student success and program completions, GTCC embraced the challenge. Their college leaders chose Achieving the Dream (ATD), Complete College America (CCA), and Completion by Design (CBD) to advise them on innovative practices to benefit student retention, success, and completion. GTCC also partnered with Ad Astra to gather and analyze student data to

inform the implementation of new practices and track institutional progress.

All these efforts are happening concurrently. But by sharing and reviewing reports with college-wide stakeholders, we are becoming increasingly better at finding actions for change."

initiatives. The guidance of these industry leaders has fueled a powerful movement on campus."

GTCC used strategic scheduling and elements of design and optimization to create pathways and roadmaps. Ad Astra's Platinum Analytics™ and Higher Education Scheduling Index (HESI™) dashboard metrics were foundational in tracking enrollment ratios, class fill rates, and schedule effectiveness.

"We have more students who are taking more classes because we are offering a more comprehensive selection of courses across all campuses," said Dr. English. In Fall 2015, 45% of students were full time. This number rose to 47% in Fall 2016. Additionally, course fill rates had a 5.2% increase from 78.5% to 83.7%. Thoughtful design, utilizing the analysis, and changing the culture... all point to improved completions," Dr. English said. "Implementing many of the researched best practices that advance student completions has increased success at GTCC."
