REGISTER FOR AN EORI NUMBER



For any business that is looking at growing and trading across the globe, or if you have a supplier base globally, EORI registration is a requirement.

Any company or organisation who imports and exports goods overseas should register for an EORI number.

You can register your business for an EORI number on the Gov.UK website.

ASSESS YOUR SUPPLY CHAIN

Brexit is likely to have an impact on both the supply chains and relationships with suppliers for most businesses that import/export goods.

There is the possibility that post Brexit every lorry driver will be required to have an international driving permit (IDP). This could dramatically slow down the flow of goods into the country.
