<p>Test Information Release (TIR) available for December, April and June test dates. This will give you the chance to see your actual test with correct answers and is a vital tool to effectively prepare for your next test.</p> <p>4 free score reports. Other score reports are \$12 each</p> <p>Scores are available 2-8 weeks after the test date</p>	<p>Optional</p> <p>40 minutes</p> <p>The essay asks you to develop a perspective on an issue and analyze the relationship between your perspective and one or more alternatives</p> <p>Essay section scores range between 0-12</p>	<p>Students only receive points for correct answers, so there is no “guessing penalty”</p> <p>Each section receives a score between 1-36. The four scores are averaged to produce a composite score which is rounded up if necessary.</p>	<p>“Superscore” refers to when admissions offices will take the best scores on different sections across multiple test dates to give the student their highest possible score.</p> <p>This rarely happens with the ACT, but colleges and universities will notice if you improve from test to test.</p>	<p>\$46.00 without writing; \$62.50 with writing</p> <p>TIR costs \$20</p> <p>Fee Waivers available based on economic need—must apply through high school counselor</p>

<p>Question and Answer Service (QAS) available for October, March and May test dates. This will give you the chance to see your actual test with correct answers and is a vital tool to effectively prepare for your next test.</p> <p>4 free score reports (8 if fee waiver). Other score reports are \$12 each</p> <p>Scores are available 4-5 weeks after the test date</p>	<p>Optional</p> <p>50 minutes</p> <p>The essay asks you to read a lengthy passage and use evidence from the passage to explain how the author built an argument to persuade an audience. You do not need to make your own persuasive argument.</p> <p>Essay section scores range between 6-24</p>	<p>Students only receive points for correct answers, so there is no “guessing penalty”</p> <p>Each section receives a score between 10-40. Evidence-Based Reading & Writing section scores are added and multiplied by 10; Math section score is multiplied by 20; both sections added for total score between 400-1600.</p>	<p>“Superscore” refers to when admissions offices will take the best scores on different sections across multiple test dates to give the student their highest possible score.</p> <p>Most colleges and universities will superscore your SAT so it is to your benefit to improve from test to test.</p>	<p>\$46 without writing; \$60 with writing</p> <p>QAS costs \$18</p> <p>Fee Waivers available based on economic need. Students apply directly to College Board.</p> <p>Fee waiver also gives four free college application fee waivers, which could save a lot of money.</p>
