Beaty, Andrea. Sofia Valdez, Future Prez.

Every morning, Abuelo walks Sofia to school . . . until one day, when Abuelo hurts his ankle at a local landfill and he can no longer do so. Sofia (aka Sofi) gets an idea—the town can turn the slimy mess into a park! **Read also:** Rosie Revere, Engineer, Iggy Peck, Architect, and Ada Twist, Scientist

Blackall, Sophie. Hello Lighthouse.

Explores the life of one lighthouse as it beams its message out to sea through shifting seasons, changeable weather, and the tenure of its final keeper. 2019 Caldecott Winner

Cooper, Elisha. River.

A fictional account of a woman's solo canoe trip down the Hudson over several days, with facts about the river, the landscape and the logistics of such a journey woven into the story.

Heder, Thyra. How Do You Dance.

There are so many ways to dance! But, what's the best way to dance? Exactly how you want to!

Houts, Michelle. Sea Glass Summer.

When his grandmother shows him a piece of sea glass, Thomas is transfixed. For the rest of the summer, he searches for more sea glass and hopes to have dreams that will reveal more of the sea's secrets.

Jory, John. The Cool Bean.

Everyone knows the cool beans. They're *sooooo* cool. And then there's the uncool *has-bean* . . . **Read also:** <u>The Good Egg</u> and <u>The Bad Seed</u>
