In reading Section 4023 & 4024, I saw where the eviction prohibitions are and cover almost all properties with federally backed mortgages. However, the prohibition on late fees, etc. appears to be only for multi-family properties with five or more units. I did see the announcement the the SBA EIDL loans have been closed, and that the PPP is currently out of money. Any updates on that?	 Congress is now debating whether and how to expand those programs. But yes, those federal programs are now closed or out of funds. Only that local jurisdictions may be rolling out additional support soon. Check with your local chamber of commerce in the next week or two to see if the county or city where your business is located is eligible for additional programs.
