

CMS Guidance Allows PTs in Private Practice to Provide Service Via Telehealth

Responding to strong APTA member advocacy

The interim rule will now include PTs in private practice among the providers able to bill for services provided through real-time face-to-face technology, as well as allowing the performance of maintaence therapy by a PTA under Part B.



LEGISLATIVE UPDATES

Though the Federal Advocacy
Forum in Washington, DC was cancelled due to the COVID-19
pandemic, that didn't stop APTA advocates from raising their voices.
On March 31, nearly 200 APTA members engaged with their members of Congress and their staff through email, social media, and virtual visits. These are the issues APTA advocates raised with their elected officials →

- > Stop Medicare
 Reimbursement Cuts Part
 One: Ask your legislator to
 include legislative language, in
 COVID-19 relief packages that
 would waive the budget
 neutrality requirements in the
 Medicare Physician Fee Schedule
 for a period of no less than 5
 years.
- > Stop Medicare
 Reimbursement Cuts Part
 Two: Request that your
 member of Congress submits a
 letter to CMS Administrator
 Seema Verma expressing
 concern about provider cuts in
 the Medicare Physician Fee
 Schedule and the need to
 reconsider the proposal in its
 current form.
- Expand therapy coverage within telehealth: The list of providers who are authorized to provide and bill for services via telehealth under Medicare needs to expand by allowing a waiver on current restrictions and making it permanent once the crisis is over. Include the CONNECT for Health Act (H.R. 4932-S. 2741) in future COVID-19 relief package.
