Day 1:

- Meet your Tour Director and board your private motor coach.
- Stop for photos in front of the White House.
- Explore Ford's Theatre and the Petersen House. Learn about the events of April 1865, when President Abraham Lincoln was assassinated by John Wilkes Booth.
- Drive down Embassy Row on your way to the National Cathedral, the second largest church in the U.S. and the fourth tallest building in the capital. Among the famous citizens buried at the cathedral are Helen Keller and Woodrow Wilson (the only president buried in the District of Columbia).
- Enjoy a guided evening tour of the Roosevelt, Jefferson, and Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorials.

Day 2:

- Take a group photo in front of the **U.S. Capitol**. Next, get a real-life civics lesson on a tour of the Capitol building, including its famous rotunda. See if your group can find your state's statue throughout the tour!
- Explore the National Archives. The building houses the original Declaration of Independence, U.S. Constitution, and Bill of Rights – known collectively as the "Charters of Freedom." Other documents in the collection include the Emancipation Proclamation and an original version of the Magna Carta.
- Visit the U.S. Holocaust Museum. This "living memorial" documents the Nazi rise to power, examines the Jewish experience during World War II, and teaches visitors about the dangers of intolerance. The "Daniel's Story" exhibit specifically showcases a young person's experiences and point of view.
- Walk through the Lincoln, Vietnam Veterans, Korean War, and World War II Memorials.
- Enjoy a **Dinner & DJ Cruise** on the Potomac River.

Day 3:

- Travel to Mount Vernon. George Washington's estate, dating back to 1735, is one of the most popular historic sites in the country. Your visit includes a tour of the stately mansion and gardens, a pioneer farm, the family tombs, and the Slave Memorial.
- Discover the world of secrets and espionage at the
 International Spy Museum, featuring the largest collection
 of spycraft tools and artifacts ever displayed to the public.
 Interactive experiences drop your students into the world of
 intelligence-gathering, where they can complete missions
 and test their skills.
- Tour **Old Town Alexandria**, a historic area dating back to 1749. Its streets are filled with boutiques, antique shops, and the nation's oldest continuously-operating marketplace.
- Explore the spookier side of Alexandria with a **Ghost & Graveyard Tour**. Entertaining guides in traditional 18th-century costumes will lead you by the light of a lantern as you weave through tales of folklore, unsolved mysteries, and vengeful spirits!

Day 4:

- Visit the **Pentagon Memorial**, established in remembrance of the site's 184 victims during the events of 9/11. Continue to the **Marine Corps War Memorial**, famous for its depiction of six soldiers raising the flag at Iwo Jima.
- Explore the National Museum of African American History and Culture. The newest Smithsonian museum, it features a collection of over 36,000 artifacts.
- Spend the afternoon at various Smithsonian institutions, including the National Air and Space Museum, the National Museum of Natural History, and the National Zoo.
