What is a worldview? You picture (view) of reality.

According to philosopher Ken Samples, a worldview "forms a mental structure that organizes one's basic or ultimate beliefs. This framework supplies a comprehensive view of what a person considers real, true, rational, good, valuable, and beautiful." Trying to make sense of the world is unique to human creatures because we are the only RATIONAL creature.

- Your dog is not pondering the nature of his existence, what it means to be a dog, the purpose of his life, etc.
- Animals are not rational creatures. This is unique to being human.

Where do you start when putting together a puzzle? The edges.

Why? Because the edges frame the picture. They help you to make sense of how the other pieces fit.

\*TWO REASONS WHY A WORLDVIEW IS POWERFUL:

1-Creates a web of beliefs that form a plausibility structure – makes some ideas more believable or less believable

2-Drives your actions – we live at the mercy of our ideas



Let's illustrate how the ideas of a worldview have serious consequences for life...



For sake of time, let's remove pantheism and just compare/contrast theism and atheism.

# Don't confuse the moment and the story.

PAGES 41-42:

Imagine someone abandoning e Lord of the Rings trilogy because he was deeply mi ed that Gandalf fell o the bridge and died as he was ghting that demon-like creature near the end of the rst book. "What kind of author kills o such a cool character as Gandalf?" he complains. "I quit! I want nothing to do with that kind of story!"

Any Tolkien groupie worth his salt would interject, "Wait! That's not the whole story. (Spoiler alert!) Gandalf doesn't die. He comes back. And he's no longer Gandalf the Grey; he's Gandalf the White. And in the end, he's part of the good that defeats evil.

Like our fictional Lord of the Rings reader, we're also at risk of losing the Story in the heat of the cultural moment, particularly when the world seems to be spinning out of control. Reeling from a tragedy or an election, trying to navigate a world where wrong is right and raunchy is popular, we often become reactionary and approach culture by asking the wrong question first.









The Christian Story of Reality can be divided into four chapters:

- CREATION  $\rightarrow$  the question of ORIGIN & IDENTITY
- THE FALL  $\rightarrow$  the question of IDENTITY continued
- REDEMPTION  $\rightarrow$  the questions of MEANING and MORALITY
- RESTORATION  $\rightarrow$  the question of DESTINY

What makes people valuable? A worldview without God will point to some characteristic that we have...

- Beauty
- Smarts/Intelligence
- Wealth
- Physical Ability

KEY QUESTION: Which of those traits do human beings share EQUALLY? ANSWER: None. And the implication? We are not equally valuable.



QUESTION: How does the Christian worldview answer the IDENTITY question? What does it mean to be human?

ANSWER: We are made in God's image.

\*The image of God in man is the only thing we share equally. Therefore, it's the only thing that can ground human EQUALITY.



Only the Christian worldview provides a basis for true human equality:

- 1-We are equal in value
- 2-We are equal in dignity
- 3-We have equal rights



The second part of the answer comes in Genesis 3: We are also fallen, sinful creatures.

We could do the same comparison with the question of DESTINY



How can we know someone's worldview? By observing their behavior. What drives much of our behavior? Worldview.
