Day 1

Arrival - Meet your On-site Coordinator and Licensed Tour Guide.

Tour Arlington National Cemetery - Statesmen and soldiers of the United States Armed Services are buried here. Witness the Changing of the Guard at The Tomb of the Unknowns and pay your respects at Kennedy's eternal flame.

Photo stop at the Iwo Jima Memorial.

Picture Stop at White House - The "People's House" is a great place for selfies and group photos.

Dinner

Night Tour of the Memorials - Be humbled by Lincoln's grandeur and reminded of the relevance of his words today. Walk over to appreciate the symbolism of the

memorial to those who made the ultimate sacrifice in the Korean War under the night stars.

Day 2

Breakfast

Tour Capitol Hill - Go to the U.S. Capitol Visitors Center and Gallery to begin a tour of the home of the legislative branch. Walk across First Street to tour The Library of Congress and the Supreme Court of the United States.

Tour National Archives - View the documents, maps, and photographs that record the American story, including The Declaration of Independence, Constitution, and Bill of Rights.

Lunch

Tour American History Museum - See the artifacts of American culture and history that we hold dear and that proudly tell the story of what it means to be an American.



Tour Natural History Museum - Exhibits showcase unrivaled scientific collections such as fossils, moon rocks, and crown jewels, including the mysterious Hope Diamond.

Dinner

Tour Roosevelt, Jefferson, and Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorials - These impressive memorials feature iconic words amidst statues of the revered historical leaders they remember.

Day 3

Breakfast

Tour World War II Memorial and Vietnam Memorial - These memorials are here in remembrance of the spirit, sacrifice, and commitment of soldiers and the American people during WWII and the Vietnam war.

Tour Holocaust Museum - Powerful exhibits and symbolic design teach about WWII and the Holocaust, remember the survivors and victims, and confront genocide and anti-Semitism.

Lunch

Tour Newseum - Experience how news is made through the lens of a journalist with interactive exhibits that highlight the importance of our First Amendment rights.

Day 4

Breakfast

Tour Jamestown Settlement - Situated near the site of the original colony, Jamestown Settlement tells the story of 17th-century Virginia, Powhatan Indians, Africans, and Europeans who converged in Colonial Virginia.

Students will discover what life was like for the first English colonists in Jamestown in 1607 as well as the cultural

encounters and events that planted the seeds of a new nation through film, gallery exhibits, and outdoor living history.

Lunch

Tour Williamsburg - This historic area, which spans more than 300 acres, is an interpretation of a colonial American city with dozens of restored or re-created buildings from colonial and Revolutionary times. Students can explore art museums, government buildings, shops, homes, gardens, and taverns of the Revolutionary City to discover how people and Industries were affected by the war.

Dinner

Historic Ghost Tour - Tour Get spooked on a narrated ghost tour of colonial Virginia and a historic graveyard.

Day 5

Yorktown Battlefield Visitor Center - Visit the site of the last major battle of the American Revolutionary War. The victory at Yorktown on October 19, 1781 secured independence for the United States and changed the course of world history.

Lunch

Yorktown Victory Center - Your students will learn by doing at this hands-on educational center that chronicles the Revolutionary period, from colonial unrest to the formation of the new nation. The life of a Revolutionary War soldier is vividly portrayed in a re-created Continental Army encampment and a working farm offers a unique opportunity to witness a typical rural lifestyle at the time of the Revolution.

The on-site museum features artifacts, exhibits, and informational films, or schedule a lecture that meets your specific curricular needs.
