## **Senior Profile**

Recommendation letters can impact your likelihood of getting into a college or earning a scholarship. College admissions officers and members of a scholarship selection committee want more than a list of descriptive academic adjectives, personal traits, activities, and honors. To say that you are *responsible*, *creative*, or *possess intellectual curiosity* is not enough. You must provide examples or anecdotes that support such personal or academic traits. This helps the reader gain insight into your true essence. Our task is to help the people reading the letter of recommendation distinguish you from other qualified applicants.

Also, all college/scholarship letters are confidential. Letters are not given to students but sent directly to the school or scholarship organization. Most letters are requested online, but if one must be mailed the student should provide a stamped and addressed envelope.

Please fill out this form digitally rather than by hand, if possible. Send a copy to each person from whom you request a recommendation letter. If you opt to give recommenders a paper copy, be sure to keep the original.

Also, when requesting letters of recommendation, please note deadlines and give the writers as much time as possible.
