

A GROWING FAMILY FINDS HELP

Four years ago, Tonia received a call asking if she would provide permanent care for her niece's four children, who were in the foster care system. Already raising four kids nearing adulthood, Tonia and her husband didn't

question whether to help. They took the kids, ages six and under, into their family.

At first, the two boys, who attended Mitchell Early Learning Center, struggled. They acted up, hit teachers, and ran around.

"They didn't know how to express their feelings," Tonia says.

A social worker funded by Women United set up an intervention plan to help the boys find better ways to manage their emotions, such as blowing on a pinwheel and taking deep breaths.

"It took time and it was hard work," Tonia said. "But over time. I could see, wow, it makes a difference."
