among living spaces, the recently-completed Watlington model near downtown Fifth Avenue and Third Street South and designed by the Romanza team, features clean lines in the kitchen that blends seamlessly with the adjoining great room. The home, recently recognized with a Sand Dollar Award from the Collier Building Industry Association for Best Kitchen, features an open and efficient design, making staging large dinner parties a breeze. A conveniently located butler's pantry provides ample space for stocking essentials.

Appliances in the Watlington include a dual-fuel range, steam oven, Sub-Zero refrigerator, microwave drawer and refrigerated drawers. "Appliances are key to the design of the kitchen – we're seeing more requests for induction cooktops, steam and convection ovens and statement-making hoods," added Allen. Earlier this year, the Romanza Interior Design team made the annual pilgrimage to their industry's mecca – High Point Market in North Carolina – to track the trends and spot the styles that are on the cutting edge of home design.

"Tradition has returned, but with cleaner lines and a more classic feel," said Allen. One home recently completed by Allen showcases a transitional style that blends classic and modern elements in the kitchen. The home features rich-stained and white painted rift-cut oak veneer cabinetry, white cloud quartz countertops with a waterfall edge, and a mosaic backsplash with a crystal cave shell finish.

"An important part of our profession is forecasting trends and staying ahead of the curve so we're able to offer clients the most up-to-date selections," noted Allen. "Many of the design elements we saw at High Point this spring are already being incorporated into the homes we design."

What else is brewing in the kitchen? Color and accessories are being kept to a minimum for a streamlined, clean look. Lighting is taking a bigger role in the kitchen design, from sleek backlit floating drywall ceiling detail to a trio of modern pendant lamps in brushed nickel that coordinate with cabinet pulls.

"We're also seeing a mix of time-worn textures and engineered woods to white and high-gloss lacquer walnut cabinetry that creates a contemporary look," said Allen.
