

Weekly Legislative Wrap-Up

State of the States



Last week, the majority of Democratic Assembly members in New York sent a letter to the

Chair of the New York State
Workers' Compensation Board
(WCB) opposing their draft
impairment guidelines. The letter
states that the WCB violated
legislative directive by rewriting
the guidelines when they were
only tasked with revising. The
legislators argue the proposed
guidelines negatively impact
injured workers, do not account
for advances in modern medicine,
and the WCB failed to consult with

stakeholders before issuing the draft. The Legislators urge the WCB to scrap the draft already issued and start again.



The bipartisan Opioid and Other Substance Use Disorders Interim Study Committee announced

a package

of six bills for the legislature to consider during the 2018 session. The package aims to curb the opioid epidemic through increased training of health care professionals, the creation of a 7-day fill limit, and required querying of the PDMP.



On Wednesday, President
Trump's Commission on
Combating Drug Addiction
and the Opioid Crisis released
its list of 56 recommendations
to the White House. Included
in the list of recommendations
is increased access to
alternatives to opioids for pain
treatment, required PDMP
checks across the country,
and required training for
doctors in safe prescribing of
controlled substances before
renewing their DEA licenses.





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Groups representing Arizona's workers' comp insurers and businesses have begun work on a proposed

bill that would target opioids and physician dispensing in the state's workers' comp system. The groups are calling for opioid fill limits, increased education requirements for prescribers, and limited reimbursement for medications dispensed outside of a licensed pharmacy. The groups hope to have a formal bill considered during the 2018 legislative session, scheduled to begin January 8.



California Insurance Commissioner, Dave Jones, called on lawmakers to grant him authority to reject excessive

rates for workers' comp plans, authority he already has for auto, home and property insurance. His statement also asked the legislature to consider a requirement that insurers share cost savings with policyholders through lower rates as part of any reform bills they consider in 2018.


