In 2010, we hosted the Jimmy & Rosalynn Carter Work Project, engaging 2,000 volunteers to build, rehab, and repair 26 homes in Minneapolis and St. Paul.



Our neighborhood revitalization program launched in 2011 and has developed strong collaborations with residents, community groups, donors, and volunteers.



Following two successful fundraising campaigns, World of Hope and New Home for Habitat, we moved into our new University Avenue office in 2014. The space has been wonderful for staff, homebuyers, supporters, and community organizations.



With Sue's guidance, we launched an advocacy program in 2009. Our Housing Heroes have since secured hundreds of millions of dollars at the local, state, and national level for the continuum of affordable housing, from disaster recovery to homeownership.

## **Buffy's story of strength and resilience**

"I was born in St. Louis, Missouri. I moved here in 1995. At that point, I found myself—for lack of a better word—homeless."

Buffy was in a tough spot. Facing homelessness with several young children was daunting, to say the least. There was constant anxiety about where her babies would lay their heads that night, or the next.

But Buffy is strong. She sought out emergency shelters. From there, she connected with a transitional housing program, and was able to live in transitional housing for a few years. But she longed for that stable place to live. And with her five rambunctious kids, she longed for a home.

> "I think I actually googled low-cost homebuying programs, and Habitat was one of the ones that came up," Buffy says. She applied and couldn't qualify because her income wasn't high enough.

> > But Buffy is resilient. She went back to school, earned her associates degree, found a better job, and re-applied to Habitat. This time, she was accepted.

Before she knew it, she was hurtling toward her dream of homeownership. She worked on getting her finances in order. She took homeownership classes on topics like "home maintenance and

repair." And she started doing her sweat equity volunteer hours on her home.

She liked meeting volunteers like you and learning new construction skills, especially when she got to work on what would be her own home. Her kids even helped by shoveling driveways of Habitat homes under construction when it snowed,



Now, Buffy's giving back. She works for the Hennepin County Department of Economic Assistance, helping people with disabilities navigate affordable housing options. She joined

the board of the transitional housing program where she once lived. And she shares her story with anyone who will listen.


