Repair Program Keeping People in their Homes

John and Marlene deserved a little extra kindness in their lives. John is disabled and a Navy Veteran. Marlene is a Veteran of the Army. Together, they raised six kids in a small home in Lexington, in Anoka County. Today three of the kids are grown and have moved out, but their youngest daughter has Down's syndrome and needs a lot of extra care.

Several years ago, John lost his steady job of 25 years when his company relocated. The family has been living paycheck to paycheck ever since. Home repairs just haven't been in the budget. John and Marlene's oldest daughter, Hannah, knew her parents needed help. She wrote a letter to Twin Cities Habitat's paint and repair program, A Brush with Kindness, to explain the challenges. She said her mom is always baking treats for other families, even though her kitchen is falling apart. She wrote that her mom is the strongest woman she knows and getting help with repairs would mean a big boost in morale for the family.
